200 Surgeons Expected For Ohio Parley

Scientific Sessions To Stress Accident, Emergency Care

More than 200 surgeons from throughout the state will gather in Toledo Friday and Saturday for the annual meeting of the Ohio chapter of the American College of Surgeons, which is being held here for the first time since 1964.

The Medical College of Ohio and Toledo-area ACS members will be co-hosts for the meeting, with Dr. John C. Kelleher, Toledo plastic and reconstructive surgeon, serving as general program chairman.

Scientific sessions at the meeting, to be held in the Commodore Perry Motor Inn, will emphasize problems in accidental injury and the surgical care of emergencies.

Opening Topics

Opening sessions on Friday morning will deal with "The Problem of Trauma: Nationwide and in Ohio," and "The Initial Assessment and Stabilization of the Trauma Patient," with Dr. Marion C. Anderson, chairman of department of surgery at the medical college, Dr. Gerald Stark, of Toledo, and Dr. Robert M. Zollinger, Jr., of Cleveland, leading discussions.

Dr. Charles Baxter, of the University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School in Dallas, an authority on burns, will deliver a major address Friday noon on how burns affect the heart.

Afternoon sessions on Friday will be devoted to clinical problems in trauma.

Industrial Accidents

Roy Haeusler, chief engineer for the Chrysler Corp.'s automotive safety division will address a breakfast meeting Saturday on what industry is doing to prevent injuries in automobile accidents, which now kill about 55,000 persons annually in the United States.

The final session Saturday after Mr. Haeusler's talk will be held at the medical college.

Registration opens at the Commodore Perry at 8 a.m. Friday. The program begins at 9 a.m.
