UT Announces Presidential Scholars

Four high school seniors will begin studies at The University of Toledo this fall as the eighth annual class of Presidential Scholars.

They are:

- Larry Ellis of Omaha, Neb ;
- John Gorman Jr. of Lambertville, Mich.;
- Meredith Krejny of Cuyahoga, Ohio;
- Ellen Weber of Mentor, Ohio.

Along with the other Presidential Scholars, these four freshmen will be advised in their academic program by UT President Frank Horton and will receive full scholarships, which cover instructional and student fees, room and board, and books and supplies. The scholarships are valued at approximately \$25,000 over the four years of undergraduate study.

This year's Presidential Scholars were selected from approximately 200 nominees whose performances on the American College Test (ACT) and Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) placed them among the nation's top one percent of graduating high school seniors. The University of Toledo Scholarship Committee selected more than 50 of these students for intensive review. Ten semifinalists were invited to the campus for interviews and luncheons with the scholarship committee. Of this group, the six not named Presidential Scholars have been offered UT scholarships under the J. Preston Levis and Bernard Lempert Academic Scholarship programs or National Merit Scholarships, as appropriate.

The Presidential Scholars program was begun in 1986 with a class of four freshmen. Since that time, four students have been selected annually.

Larry Ellis will enroll in the College of Engineering with an undecided major.

He was first in his senior class of 10 at Brownell-Talbot College Preparatory School. His honors include being named a National Achievement Semi-Finalist and a member of Who's Who Among High School Students for two years.

He was chapter president of the National Honor Society, as well as class president and class treasurer, and was elected to attend the Nebraska Council of Youth Leadership Conference. He was selected to attend MIT Orientation at Burke High School and named the Omaha World-Herald's "Teen in the News."

His high school counselor said, "Larry is a superb student, one of those few who always seem to be 30 seconds ahead of the instructor."

Joseph Gorman Jr. will enroll in the College of Arts and Sciences with a pre-med major. He hopes to specialize in pediatric orthopedics or cardiology.

He was ranked ninth in his class of 142 at St. Francis de Sales High School in Toledo. Some of his honors include being named a National Merit Commended Student and Outstanding Latin Student of 1992.

He participated in Toledo Hospital's Medical Explorer program for two years and works there as an orthopedic assistant. He also was involved in Student Council, the Math Club, Youth to Youth and intramural sports. He was a member of the football team for four years.

The president of St. Francis de Sales said, "John is a very fine young man, both academically and as a human being ... He gives promise of great success in the college of his choice."

Meredith Krejny will enroll in the College of Arts and Sciences with a major in mathematics. She hopes to become a meteorologist.

She placed second in her class of 210 at Maple Heights Senior High School. She was involved in cross country, basketball and track. She held various leadership positions within her school's band, including band president and marching band drum major. She also was president of her school's chapter of the National Honor Society and held various offices in the 4-H Club, including president.

She was a member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, which evaluates high school facilities for reaccreditation, and she attended the National Young Leaders Conference in Washington, D.C.

Ellen Weber will enroll in the College of Engineering with an undecided major.

She ranked 15th in her class of 702 at Mentor High School. Some of her honors include being a National Merit Commended Student and being placed on the Academic Wall of Fame.

She was vice president of Future Leaders of America and a yearbook editor for two years. She also was treasurer of the Key Club, a member of the National Honor Society, and an officer in the Catholic Youth Organization.

The mathematics department coordinator at Mentor High said, "Ellen is always willing to do that little extra, to go a little bit further, to ask that second question ... She has a unique gift, an instinct for the jugular as it were, of seeing a problem in its total and sensing strategies that might apply in its solution."

Summer Theatre Returns to UT

The return of The University of Toledo summer theatre has been delayed, according to UT's department of theatre, film and dance.

Shakespeare's "As You Like It" will open in the Center for Performing Arts Center Theatre Friday, July 23, through Sunday, July 25, with additional performances Wednesday, July 28, through Sunday, Aug. 1. Curtain time for all performances is 7:30 p.m.

The delay will allow guest artist William Smith to direct "As You Like It." Smith, UT associate professor emeritus of theatre, is a noted director who has taken University productions and student actors to regional American College Theatre Festival competitions. He most recently directed the winter musical theatre production of "Assassins" and the fall 1991 musical "The Boy Friend." Also an accomplished professional designer, he worked on the set design of the John Hughes movie "Dennis the Menace." His guest direction of "As You Like It" has been made possible by a grant from the Arts Commission of Greater Toledo.

Ticket prices for "As You Like It" are \$9 for general, \$7 for seniors and UT faculty/staff, and \$3 students for Friday, Saturday and Sunday performances. For Wednesday and Thursday performances, the prices are \$7 for general, \$5 for seniors and UT faculty/staff, and \$2 for students. Tickets are available through Selectix at 243-7000, John F. Savage Hall at 537-4231 and the Center for Performing Arts box office at 537-2375.

The Center for Performing Arts Studio Theatre will feature the return of "The Backyard Theatre Project," a student company founded by Patricia Savieo, department alumni, to be directed this summer by Mark Leasor, theatre major. The company will present a collection of short plays, including "Family Voices" by Harold Pinter, "The Sandbox" by Edward Albee, and "A Day for Surprises" by John Guare. National Youth Sports Program Returns to UT

The National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) is returning for its 25th summer at The University of Toledo.

NYSP is a program that introduces inner-city children to the opportunities of higher education. UT is one of 170 colleges and universities participating in the program this summer. It is scheduled to begin at UT on Monday, July 19, and continue through Friday, Aug. 20.

About 450 children are expected to take part in the program this year, according to Dr. Steven Ranck, UT professor of health promotion and human performance and NYSP administrator at UT.

The program will consist of sports events and enrichment and drug education courses designed to develop the children's social, athletic and employment skills.

Activities will be held at the Health Education Center on the Bancroft campus and will include basketball, karate, gymnastics, tennis, soccer, volleyball, swimming, modern dance, and track and field events. Each child will attend three scheduled activities a day. Enrichment classes will address such issues as drug awareness and alcohol abuse, nutrition, social security benefits, personal grooming and employment.

UT sponsors the program in cooperation with the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the U.S. Office of Community Services, and the city of Toledo. The NCAA has provided a \$59,500 grant to operate the program. UT's contribution of services is valued at \$150,000.

The free program is open to children ages 10 to 16, but at least 90 percent of the children must come from families with financial need.

Free meals will be served at the University through a subsidy from the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Office of Community Services.

Psychologist Albert Ellis to Conduct Workshops at UT

Dr. Albert Ellis, world-renowned psychologist and founder and president of the Institute for Rational-Emotive Therapy in New York City, will conduct two workshops at The University of Toledo's SeaGate campus.

The distinguished social scientist will address "Fundamentals of Rational-Emotive Therapy" and "Sex Therapy – A Rational-Emotive Approach" on Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 2 and 3, respectively, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at The University of Toledo at SeaGate Centre (401 Jefferson Ave.).

For nearly half a century, Ellis has practiced psychotherapy, marriage and family counseling, and sex therapy. Early in his career, he practiced classical psychoanalysis, which he found to be time-consuming and inefficient. Clients could not afford as many sessions as they needed and, if they could, they gained insight into themselves but did not necessarily learn how to solve their problems. To rectify this, he began experimenting with active, direct approaches, which he thought resulted in better therapeutic outcomes for his clients. It was in 1955 that Ellis combined philosophy and behavior therapy and introduced a humanistic, action-oriented approach to psychotherapy that revolutionized the field of psychology.

Rational-Emotive Therapy (RET) views an individual's personal philosophy of life as the main factor in determining what kind of existence he or she will lead. The RET perspective states that it is not negative events and adverse circumstances that cause maladjustment, but how a person views these things that cause emotional and behavioral problems. Basically, RET works by identifying dysfunctional aspects of personal philosophies and teaching alternative philosophies of life that lead to more optimal functioning. RET is used worldwide by more than 12,000 psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers and counselors.

Among contemporary psychotherapists, Ellis is known for using force, efficiency, humor and deep-seated philosophical change in his therapeutic work. He is highly regarded not only as a psychotherapist, but also as a lecturer and author. He has written more than 50 books and monographs on a variety of topics, including *The Art and Science of Love*, *A New Guide to Rational Living*, *Sex Without Guilt*, *How to Live with a "Neurotic,"* and *How to Stubbornly Refuse to Make Yourself Miserable About Anything*

– *Yes, Anything!* He also served as consulting or associate editor for more than a dozen professional journals.

Ellis is a fellow of the American Psychological Association (APA) and has served as president of its division of consulting psychology and a member of its council of representatives. He is a fellow and past president of the Society for Scientific Study of Sex, as well as a fellow of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists, the American Orthopsychiatric Association and the American Sociological Association, to name a few. In 1992, he was elected president of the Advisory Council of Distinguished Humanists.

His efforts, which have left a mark on the practice of clinical psychology, have been recognized by several professional societies. In 1985, the APA presented Ellis with its major award for distinguished professional contributions to knowledge. He also received the American Association for Counseling and Development's top honor – its professional development award. In 1992, he was awarded the Townsend Harris Medal by the Alumni Association of the City College of New York, where he earned his bachelor's degree. He earned master's and doctoral degrees from Columbia University.

Total cost of the two-day workshop is \$110 for professionals and \$75 for students. The cost to attend one workshop is \$65 and \$50, respectively. Parking, lunch and materials are included. Students must present a valid student ID before the workshops.
