sexually active are more than programs that promote abstinence alone.

The research also shows that comprehensive abstinence-based programs do not promote earlier or increased sexual activity among young people.

There is no evidence whatever that abstinence-only programs are effective at reducing teen pregnancy or sexual activity. A 1997 report, "No Easy Answers," from the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy echoed the 1994 findings reported at the fifth biennial meeting of the Society for Research on Adolescence, which concluded that there were "no methodologically sound studies that demonstrate the effectiveness of curricula that teach abstinence as the only effective means of preventing teen pregnancy."

A recent \$5 million abstinence-only program (ENABL) that did have a methodologically sound, rigorous evaluation found that these abstinence-only participants were more likely to become sexually active than nonparticipants.

When programs fail to teach about contraception, young people are poorly served. At some point in their lives, most people will become sexually active, and information about contraception and the prevention of sexually transmitted infection is needed to save lives and avoid unintended pregnancy.

Planned Parenthood of Northwest Ohio welcomes inquiries about family life and sex education curricula. There is no excuse for spending public or private dollars on ineffective programs, given the research from the field.
