

Entrance Regulations Changed

To Permit High School Students To Obtain Degree Requirements

A program to permit high school juniors to begin study at the University at the end of the present school year has been announced by Dr. Raymond L. Carter, Dean of Administration.

The plan, to apply only during the war emergency, will enable students to be well advanced on their college requirements by the time they reach draft age, thus allowing them to enter service as commissioned officers, Dean Carter said.

Three Plans Open

The entering students will fall into three classifications according to the amount of credits they have already required.

1. Students with 12 units may enroll in the University summer school as special students, returning to high school in the fall for completion of their high school work. They will receive University credit for the work only after they have graduated from high school and have done additional work here.

2. Students having 14 high school units or more at the end of their junior year may register at the University as regular students either in the summer session or the regular September session. Upon completion of a year's satisfactory work here they will be given their high school diplomas at the time of graduation of their regular class.

3. Students with 15 high school units or more in February may register as regular students at the University. Upon completion of a semester's satisfactory work they will receive their regular diplomas in June.

Must Get Recommendation

In cases 2 and 3 students will receive full college credit for all work done with a grade of A, B or C, but under no circumstances will any college credit be given for work done with grade below C before the student has received his school diploma, according to Dean Carter.

The recommendation of the high school principal is necessary for entrance under this plan, he said.
