Fire, Air Raid Plans Outlined; Strict Precautions To Be Taken In Guarding Property, Equipment

Defense preparations at the University have recently been started with plans both for immediate and long range objective. Dr. Raymond L. Carter, dean of administration, heads the University defense committee.

Among immediate activities will be the enlisting of students to act in various defense capacities. Student Council members William Kamke and Donald Gallagher are issuing questionnaires to the student body. People who desire to help may sign up, but co-operation will not be compulsory.

Students are asked to sign up to lead games during air raid protection periods, to give first aid, to run elevators, to check fire equipment, to act as guards, and to drive cars as ambulances.

Plans for air raid precautions include the following:

1. Wayland C. Byers, purchasing agent; Dr. Wayne Dancer, associate professor of mathematics; Dr. Marion A. Weightman, University physician, and Michael Wisniewski, assistant superintendent of buildings and grounds, have been asked to draw up plans in some detail for an air raid drill.
