## UNIVERSITY DAY CELEBRATION TUESDAY, MARCH 18th,

### Big Program is Planned---Chancellor of University of Pittsburg is to be Here.

### President Stowe Says:

On the 18th of March the University will celebrate "University Day," the thirty-fifth anniversary of the passage of an ordinance by Council of the city of Toledo, establishing Toledo University as a Municipal University.

Three ideals inspire the University in the work it is endeavoring to do as a municipal institution: the ideals of opportunity, service, and co-operation.

In order to commemorate the 35th anniversary of the taking over of the University by the city, the customary celebration will be held on Tuesday, March 18, which is known as University day. As the plans now stand, there will probably be a reception for high school seniors in the afternoon, similar to the one given last year. A musical program, and light refreshments furnished by the organizations, in the afternoon will be followed by a more impressive service at night.

The address of the evening will be made by Samuel Black McCormick, M.A., D.D., LL.D., Chancellor of the University of Pittsburgh. Professor McCormick has had a broad experience in municipal university work in connection with the successful Pittsburgh school and is well prepared to speak upon any phase of its activities.

Other numbers on the program will aid in lending the appropriate solemnity to the occasion. "America," sung by the audience, will precede selections by the Nold trio. Mayor Schreiber will give a message from the city fathers.

War Mother medals will be bestowed on the mothers of S. A. T. C. men at this time. All student army training men are expected to sit in one section and to stand at attention during the presentation of the medals. Captain Eaton will be present.

A solo by Roscoe Mulholland, Invictus, by Hahn, will precede the address. The Recessional by Kipling and De Koven, will be sung by the following quartette: Mrs. Charles H. Brady, soprano; Mrs. Charles K. Chapman, contralto; William A. Howell, tenor; R. C. Mulholland, baritone; Charles Sumner Johnson will be the accompanist.

Concluding the program will be the University song by the audience. The whole day Tuesday will be a school holiday and will be spent in appreciation of the benefits and privileges of the University.

Members of the faculty have planned a luncheon at the Secor to be given to the prominent business men of the city in honor of University Day and of Chancellor McCormick, who will deliver an address on this occasion. The mayor and his council, the University Trustees, newspaper editors, and representatives from practically every organization in Toledo will be the guests of honor. Toasts will be a feature of the occasion.
