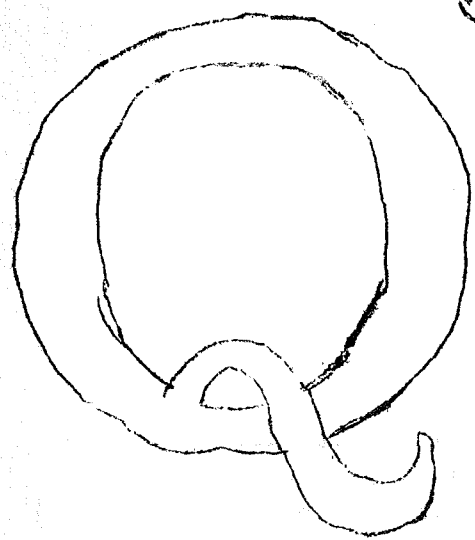


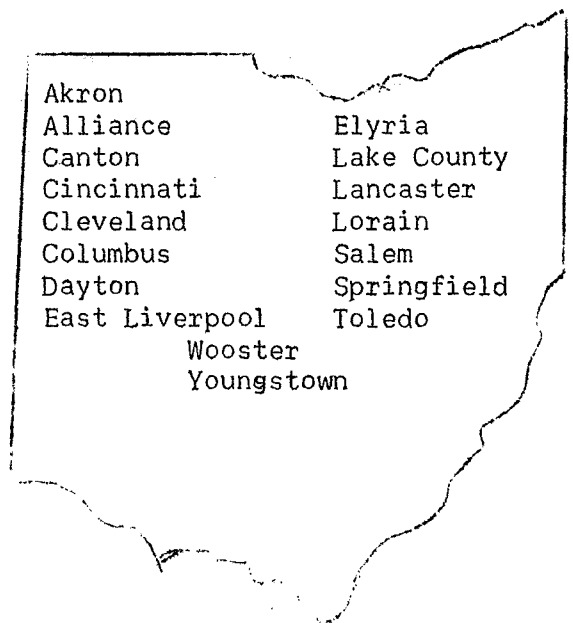

When I received the District Governor's materials last October from the former governors, it was most interesting to read, sort, study, and peruse. I learned a lot about Sixth District that I did not know. One of the findings was that many years ago Sixth District had an official newsletter called "QUOTA QUOTES". Several of the Districts throughout International issue such an edition, so I decided to revive this custom by asking each President to prepare a report on story of her club's activities during 1966-67. These reports were sent to me at the time of my official visit and they follow.

May I first give some of the interesting experiences of a District Governor? In September 1965 I was greatly honored by being elected Lt. Governor at the Conference in Youngstown; and promoted to Governor last September in Akron. This has been one of the busiest and most thrilling years I have ever spent. I have enjoyed every part of it--the friends I have met and the renewed acquaintances; new friends made; interesting business meetings and parties; invitations and visitations; flowers; gifts; good wishes; letters; and cards. Yes, there have been some trials and tribulations and problems to be discussed and solved--all of which leads to Progress.

Some of you will remember that was part of my theme for the year--"Today's Plans Make Tomorrow's Progress" which I gave in my acceptance speech. Plans were laid following the close of the regular session of the Conference in regard to proposed budget; official visits; acceptance of East Liverpool to act as hostess for the 1967 Conference in Steubenville on September 22-24.

Youngstown celebrated their 44th Anniversary in November, and I started my official visits on January 3 and ended on March 28. The warm welcome given me on these visits will leave pleasant memories for years to come, and I wish to extend my thanks again to all.

I had attended Governors' Seminar in Washington, D.C. in November and meeting there with 26 other Governors, Int. Pres. Dr. Edith Incababian; V.P. Vivien Ingram; Exec. Sec. Dona Lee Haynes; Parliamentarian Mrs. Marie Suthers; and the 7 members of the office staff was informative as we were instructed as to our duties as governors.

There are times during the year that things move slowly. Following the months of visitations, next came Installations of officers at Columbus, Cleveland, Salem, Elyria, Wooster and East Liverpool; and assisted at Lorain and Canton, and attended Alliance.

Plans for Presidents' Council in May 1967 near Mansfield required innumerable hours of preparation. It was well-worth the effort to have all 17 presidents present and to receive their thanks for this school of instruction.

Next comes International Convention at Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada on June 28-July 1. Traveling there mostly by train enabled my family and I to enjoy a much needed vacation and to enjoy the beautiful scenery enroute. This gathering was again rewarding for all presidents were there except three--one was absent because of a recent marriage; another detained because of a very serious auto accident. The programs and entertainment were well-planned and we came away feeling it had been a wonderful experience.

All of which brings us to the completion of a full cycle of a busy year as we make plans for another Fall Conference.

The courtesies extended me have been most appreciated, and once again I wish to say "Thanks" to all of you.

Prior to the Conference Lena Lewis and I met with the Sixth District Scholarship and Loan Committee (for Kent State University) to discuss the various points our Club had raised on the questionnaire sent out by the committee. Ruth Bender prepared a list of schools in Ohio with approved programs in the field of speech and hearing. I mailed the list to Charlotte Shaffer for use in a study of the possibility of enlarging the scope of the Sixth District Scholarship and Loan Fund.

I presided at all Board meetings, business meetings, program meetings and attended most committee meetings. The committee chairmen have been enthusiastic and dedicated and all committees have functioned well.
