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TOWARD GREATER FREEDOM

"Toward Greater Freedom: Problems of War and Peace," just published by the Commission to Study the Organization of Peace, is designed primarily as a unit of work to be used in connection with courses in history, economics, problems of democracy, etc., in the last two years of high school. The pamphlet is based, as the foreword on page 2 indicates, on a manuscript prepared by a Workshop on Post-war Problems composed of a group of New York City high school teachers of the social studies. The members of the Workshop worked in the offices of the Commission for a two-week period in the summer of 1942.

Prepared by teachers, with aids to study, glossary and bibliography, and attractively illustrated, "Toward Greater Freedom" should find a wide usefulness in schools, and elsewhere.

The pamphlet considers why we should study post-war problems now, gives a brief survey of the world we live in and the world we want, discusses the problems facing the world community after the war, outlines plans for a permanent world organization for peace, and concludes with a strong statement on the part our own country should play.

It is the hope of the Commission that teachers will find "Toward Greater Freedom" useful in their classrooms and that adult study groups will also be able to make good use of it. The Commission will appreciate review notices in suitable publications.
