

## BY THE WAY

Mayor Schreiber will be asked to deliver November 11, Armistice Day, a civic holiday, by the American Legion, which is planning a big celebration.

The house, at Washington has passed and sent to the senate, a bill making transportation of a motor automobile from one state to another subject of the new year's legislature and \$5,000 fine.

As the result of illness and physical exhaustion, President Wilson has left for the Peace Treaty and return of duty to Washington from White House, September 26.

It is officially announced that William C. Redfield, Secretary of Commerce, has tendered his resignation to President Wilson. The resignation has been accepted and becomes effective November 1.

General Alvarado, formerly governor of Yucatan, has published an open letter to President Carranza General Obregon begging them to devote themselves unswervingly to restoring order, justice and peaceful industry in Mexico, and warning them that American intervention cannot be prevented if they neglect his appeal.

With the ever increasing number of students the problem of providing University accommodations becomes yearly more vital. The present enrollment strains the capacity of the buildings which are now equipped for class room work and if overcrowding is to be avoided, larger housing arrangements will soon become necessary.

Use of the buildings on the University farm is of course the obvious solution to the difficulty. On this 160 acre farm are three buildings, a main building which is a two story brick structure that has been suggested as the possible location for the boys opportunity school, a good sized frame building, built for a barracks and mess hall for the S. A. T. C. with the intention that at the dismantling of the S. A. T. C. it be converted into a University gymnasium and a large barn which at some future time may be used by the University to house high grade cattle.
