Meetings of the officers, commissioners and assistant commissioners before the opening of school.

Dick Gross, the president, met with the board twice in June to explain his policy and to make and hear other suggestions.

Summer meeting August 13th at the home of Dick Gross, a picnic to get better acquainted and to make further suggestions and plans.
(I was not able to attend this meeting.)

Meeting September 1st at home of Dick Gross to make definite plans for Freshman Day and the first week of school. Mary Durbin, secretary, absent and Ronald Hinds, the athletic commissioner left early.

Meeting September 8th at 1:00 P.M. with Mr. Langstaff to ask questions and clear up matters of policy. Sue Volker, finance commissioner, absent because of her job. Dick and I met with Mr. Langstaff on Wednesday the last week of vacation to go over the plans for the Freshman Day program.

Friday Sept. 8 Freshman Day

1. Commissioners help direct students to the auditorium.
2. Activity part of the program.

Mr. Meissner makes an appeal for loyalty to Scott--well received
Mr. Langstaff introduced me; I talked a few minutes and introduced the officers.

Dick Gross introduced the commissioners and then asked Marshall Isenberg to explain the Thistle sale the first day of school and he told them that Thistles would be used in Everyday Living classes the whole first week of school.

Ronald Hinds, the athletic commissioner, explained the football season ticket sale and introduce Mr. Sacksteder who talked briefly about the team.

Marjorie Keller, the social commissioner, explained and conducted a tour of the building.

Freshmen comments made in Everyday Living classes in connection with this Friday meeting and others which we need to keep in mind as we plan other such programs or as we write a Handbook.

1. Tour should be organized in smaller groups and the leaders of these groups should have "large" voices.
2. Perhaps the floor plan could be explained from a large diagram on the stage.
3. Out of town students should also be included in such a tour and explanation of the activity program.
4. Floor plans of the building should be given to all new students--when a handbook is printed these should be included.
5. It helped to have the Friday meeting, the tour, the Thistle used in Everyday Living classes the first week, the explanation of rules in home rooms and Everyday Living classes.
6. It was suggested that all rules and regulations should be printed rather than just given orally.
7. Student representatives should be sent to the eighth grades to talk about clubs, Thistle etc.
8. A get-acquainted day for new students and teachers was suggested.

3. 246 season tickets sold altogether.

2. Home rooms are changed.
3. Census cards made out.
4. Club application blanks can be obtained in room 214 at 3:00

Friday Sept. 15

1. B schedule
2. Outdoor mass meeting for Central game in the north stands. Ray Reissbach, William Walker, LeRoy Jordan, Ed Mann at the 1st floor doors. Bill Malisch at gate outside. Mr. Meissner master of ceremonies. Mr. Sacksteder speaks and introduces the team. An excellent program but band had not had enough practice, but band does get more recruits after that.
3. Club application blanks given out again in room 214 at 3:00 P.M.

All during the week Everyday Living classes have been using the Thistle to get acquainted with the school. Thursday 3rd, 5th, 6th, hours these classes, Mr. Harvey's chorus and 116 study hall groups went in the auditorium to practice Scott Hi Forever and the Scott Loyalty song. Friday these M.D.L. classes discussed clubs and made out club application blanks.

It was decided to make the magazine drive a freshmen class project if Mrs. Featherstone, the newly appointed adviser for that class, approves.
Money collection approved for gift or memorial or both for Mr. Demorest. This to be announced at the S.C. meeting October 2nd. Dick Gross to appoint a committee to make final plans and Miss Keplinger will be asked to advise this committee.

SERVICE COMMISSION THIS GROUP WILL HANDLE SPECIAL CAMPAIGNS AND ALL OTHER DUTIES NOT TAKEN CARE OF BY THE OTHER COMMISSIONS.

SOCIAL COMMISSION THE PURPOSE OF THE COMMISSION ADVISED BY MISS SCHAFF IS TO PROMOTE AND DIRECT A SOCIAL PROGRAM WHICH WILL PROVIDE PLEASURABLE ACTIVITIES FOR THE STUDENTS AND FACULTY IN SMALL AND LARGE GROUPS AND ALSO PROVIDE OPPORTUNITIES FOR MAKING FRIENDS.
