I have learned that Mr. Frank McCreery, who is now a prisoner at Atlanta Penitentiary for violation of the United States liquor laws, is now eligible for parole.

Frank McCreery was a barber and part owner of a shop in this city and I have known him for a long time and assisted in making the arrest of McCreery and others connected with him. I believe that he was used by others, namely one Burton who is now confined to the Atlanta Penitentiary, as a tool. McCreery has very little education and is easily led. I do not believe him to be vicious or a non-lawful citizen.

I would be willing to sponsor McCreery or assist him, if granted a parole, and I believe he has learned his lesson and would make a good citizen.
