TU "prexy" writes in Chi Omega publication

A plea for a laboratory frame of mind in the study of foreign relations is voiced by Dr. Wilbur W. White, president of the University of Toledo, in the quarterly publication of Chi Omega, national sorority.

Writing on "The Responsibility of the College Woman," in the current issue of "The Eleusis of Chi Omega," the author contends that "it is difficult to imagine a time when it was more imperative than now that educated persons assume a proper share of the responsibilities of the democratic citizen."

Knowledge and understanding are the first phase of responsibility in the field of foreign policy, Dr. White believes, with the ability to distinguish between fact and fancy an early goal.

"If we fail to solve the problems in...the formal study of international affairs, practical knowledge or scholarly appreciation in others will have no opportunity of development in the cataclysm of another major international conflict," the author continues.

Glowing tribute is paid the League of Women Voters, "...a pressure group, and an effective one," writes Dr. White, "whose goal is not personal or party gain, but better government."

Urging the application of brains and actions ^{to the fundamental} -as well as oratory -problems of democracy, the author concludes that "learning without action is fruitless while action without intelligence is the worst kind of misdirection."
