Dr. William S. Carlson, president of The University of Toledo, will officially open TU's 13th annual Hole-In-One golf tournament on Wednesday (August 17) at Par Three Golf Course (5080 Monroe St.).

President Carlson has been issued an official tee time of 10 a.m. to fire the first shot at the hole which is 150 yards from the tees. Also attending the opening ceremonies will be Jules D. Lippmann, chairman of TU's Board of Directors; Jesse R. Long, executive vice president; Willard W. Smith, vice president-treasurer; Board of Directors of the University and officers and board members of both the Alumni Association and the Alumni Foundation.

Immediately following the first tee shots the course will be open to both amateurs and pros from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. daily through August 28, according to Paul Johnson, general chairman of the tournament.

Top prize in the tournament is \$1,000 for a hole-in-one, with merchandise prizes totaling \$100 to be awarded daily. A \$500 prize will be awarded to the person scoring the closest shot to the hole, and there will be a special prize of a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond for the closest shot by a woman during the tournament, Mr. Johnson said.

This year, the TU Alumni Association, which sponsors the tournament in cooperation with the Varsity T Club, has purchased 40 dozen pastel golf balls in blue, pink and yellow for use by women in the tournament. Women will have four shots for \$1, while men receive three shots. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day, special matinee prizes will be awarded to women who participate in the tourney.

Proceeds from the annual tournament provide scholarships for TU students. Since 1959, each dollar raised in the tournament has drawn nine dollars in federal matching funds. In the 12 years of tournament play, a total of \$67,550 has been raised. Matching federal funds have added \$360,450 bringing the total available for scholarships to \$428,000. A total of 1,421 scholarships have been

Par Three donates its facilities for the tournament. Prizes for the event are donated by business, industry, civic groups and individuals, Mr. Johnson said.
