A group of six doctoral-level graduate students have begun work as three-year administrative interns for the study of college and university administration at The University of Toledo, according to Dr. John H. Russel, chairman-coordinator of the internship program, professor of higher education and special assistant to University president Dr. William S. Carlson.

Each of the six interns receives an administrative assignment during the academic year and, at the same time, takes courses toward completion of the requirements for the doctoral degree.

In addition to waiver of instructional fees, each receives a stipend of \$3,600 for the first year, \$4,000 for the second year, and \$5,000 for the third and final year of the program. The internships are funded by The University of Toledo from its own general fund.

This year's class of interns, the third group in as many years, includes:

-- Amanda Belle, a native of Jacksonville, Florida, who earned her bachelor's degree at Paine College, Atlanta, Georgia, and her master's degree at Atlanta University. Mrs. Belle has been a member of the faculty of Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, and attended a six-week seminar at Haile Selassie University, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, during the summer of 1967.

-- Charles A. Blood, from Livingston, New Jersey, who earned his bachelor's degree at Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., and his master's degree at the State University of New York at Buffalo;

-- Harold G. Kimes, a native of San Antonio, Texas, who holds a bachelor's and a master's degree from Trinity University in San Antonio, where he served as assistant director of admissions until this fall;

-- Hermann C. Girard, a native of Jonquiere, Canada, and most recently a member of the faculty of the College de Jonquiere, who earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Laval in Quebec and his master's degree from Bowling Green State University;

-- James O. Nichols, graduate assistant at The University of Toledo since January, 1969, who was born in Corpus Christi, Texas, and who holds a bachelor's degree from Trinity University, San Antonio, and a master's degree from Alaska Methodist University at Anchorage;

-- and, James Schroeder, a native of Akron, Ohio, and most recently a member of the faculty of Rogers High School, Toledo, who holds a bachelor's degree from Miami University, Oxford, and a master's degree from The University of Toledo.

Mrs. Belle will work in institutional research under Dr. Richard R. Perry, associate executive vice president and director of institutional research. Mr. Blood has been assigned to the administrative offices of the College of Arts and Sciences and will work with Arthur H. Black, associate dean of the college. Mr. Kimes will work in the area of student services in association with Dr. Harold L. Hakes, associate dean of students. Mr. Girard will work with Dr. Theodore Wilson, associate dean of the University's Community and Technical College. Mr. Nichols will join the staff of the Division of Continuing Education under Dean Clyde Balch. And Mr. Schroeder will work within the College of Education under Dr. Kenneth C. DeGood, associate dean.

The administrative assignments are made for one year only, Dr. Russel said, so that interns can gain experience in a variety of positions and advance to more responsible assignments during the three-year program.

Interns beginning their second year in the program are Larry McDougle, former member of the faculty of Findlay College; Sister Justine Hill, a nun of the Order of St. Ursula and former teacher at Central Catholic High School, Toledo; Phillip Coffman, former chairman of the department of music at Jamestown College, Jamestown, North Dakota; Samuel L. Creighton, formerly director of dormitories at Virginia State College, Petersburg, Virginia; Paul Benson, former admissions counselor at Michigan Technological University,

Houghton; and, Carlo Blanco, former member of the faculty of the University of Hawaii.

Interns beginning their third year in the program include Dennis Bates, former assistant director of admissions at Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio and Irvin Kyle, former chairman of the department of history at Mary Manse College, Toledo.

Dr. Bruce Weier, who entered the program in the fall of 1967, terminated his participation when he was awarded his doctoral degree by The University of Toledo in August, 1969. He has become vice president of Mount Marty College, Yankton, South Dakota.

William Lanning, who also would have been a third year intern, withdrew from the internship program to accept a post as dean of student activities at Bowling Green State University.

Dr. Robert T. Sandin today (November 11) was named assistant vice president for academic affairs at The University of Toledo by the University's Board of Trustees. Dr. Sandin's appointment is effective November 17, 1969. He will continue to serve as professor of higher education and as director of the University's Center for the Study of Higher Education.

Dr. Sandin will work with Dr. William H. Leckie, vice president for academic affairs, who notes that his assistant's primary responsibility will be development of a program budget for the academic area. Dr. Leckie added that Dr. Sandin also will be concerned with all matters affecting academic programs at the University.

Commenting on the appointment, Dr. William S. Carlson, UT president, said, "The need for academic reform and change is obvious in these times. It is a process that requires a great deal of time and effort. The University has a special committee (Academic Study Group for Undergraduate Education) working on this, and the appointment of Dr. Sandin will give Dr. Leckie the opportunity to spend more time on important long range academic problems of the University."

Dr. Leckie noted that he had been reviewing possible candidates for the position for several months and in selecting Dr. Sandin had decided that "we have on campus a truly outstanding scholar and administrator who has the confidence of all who know him. Dr. Sandin has a deep, abiding interest in curriculum and in the welfare of the students."

Dr. Sandin joined the UT faculty in fall, 1968, as professor of higher education and took over the direction of the Center for the Study of Higher Education which was formed in 1967 to contribute the educational resources of the University

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to the development of certain liberal arts colleges in northwestern Ohio and southeastern Michigan.

Speaking on behalf of the College of Education, Dr. Kenneth C. DeGood, associate dean, said, "We are delighted with the appointment of Dr. Sandin to the post of assistant vice president for academic affairs. I am certain that he brings to the post a comprehensive knowledge of the workings of higher education and a commitment to serve The University of Toledo in this period of rapid change."

A native of Chicago, Illinois, Dr. Sandin received the bachelor of arts degree from Bethel College (St. Paul, Minnesota), the bachelor of divinity degree from the Bethel Theological Seminary (St. Paul), and master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees from the University of Minnesota (Minneapolis). In 1961, he spent the summer studying in Sweden.

Before joining the UT faculty, he was professor of philosophy at Augsburg College (Minneapolis), and also has served as associate academic dean at Bemidji State College (Bemidji, Minnesota), as academic dean at Northwestern College (Minneapolis) and as a member of the faculty of Bethel College.

Dr. Sandin is the author of several articles for professional journals including "The Founding of the Uppsala School" in the Journal of the History of Ideas and "The Elimination of Metaphysics" in the Monist. He also is the editor and translator of "Axel Hagerstrom" for Philosophy and Religion. Dr. Sandin is a member of the American Philosophical Association and of the Association for Higher Education.

Dr. Sandin is married to the former Zella Mae McFarlin. They are the parents of a son --Karl -- and live at 2436 Briarwood Lane.

Dr. Burton R. Clark, professor of sociology and chairman of the department of sociology at Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, will address the second in a special series of six seminars on the organization and administration of a university being sponsored by The University of Toledo's president, Dr. William S. Carlson.

Dr. Clark will speak on "The Failures of Organization in the Modern University." beginning at 3 p.m. on Thursday, November 20, in Dana Auditorium of the University's Engineering-Science Building.

The seminar is expected to last for about two hours. It will be free and open to the public.

Purpose of the series is to provide a forum at The University of Toledo for distinguished scholars who have relevant suggestions about how to effect developments that will be needed to meet the new and changing objectives in higher education in the future, Dr. Carlson said.

Dr. Clark earned his bachelor's and doctor of philosophy degrees in sociology at the University of California at Los Angeles. He has served as a Social Science Research Council fellow, and was a member of the faculties of Stanford University, Stanford, California; Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts; and of the University of California at Berkeley, before accepting his current post at Yale University in 1966.

He also has held research posts at Harvard's Center for Field Studies and at the University of California's Center for the Study of Higher Education on the Berkeley campus.

He is the author of four volumes dealing with the sociology of education and with university organization and administration, including "The Distinctive College: Antioch,

Reed and Swarthmore, which is scheduled for publication in 1970 by The Aldine Publishing Company of Chicago.

He also authored a chapter of "Selection and Educational Differentiation," which was edited by Dr. T.R. McConnell and published by Berkeley's Center for the Study of Higher Education. Dr. McConnell addressed the first seminar of this series on October 30.

Dr. Clark is a former chairman of the American Sociological Association's Section on the Sociology of Education, and an associate editor of "Social Problems," and "The Sociology of Education," professional journals in his field. He holds membership in the American Sociological Association, the Society for the Study of Social Problems, the Eastern Sociological Society, and the American Association of University Professors.

Future seminars in the series will be addressed by Dr. Wilbur J. Cohen, dean of the College of Education of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and former under-secretary of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare; Dr. Henry Margenau, professor of physics at Yale University; Dr. Richard Peterson, research psychologist and staff director of the American Council On Education's Washington-based Committee On Campus Tension; and by Dr. W. Max Wise, professor of higher education at Columbia University's Teachers College.
