Ohio Governor James A. Rhodes will speak at dedication ceremonies for The University of Toledo's \$7.3 million Community and Technical College facilities at the Scott Park campus, Parkside Boulevard and Nebraska Avenue, on Friday, April 24, at 1:30 p.m.

The present, six-building complex was financed through \$6 million from the state of Ohio, \$1 million from the federal government and \$300,000 from a two-mill municipal tax which expired after conversion of the University from city to state status in 1967.

Presiding at the dedication ceremonies will be Dr. Newton C. Rochte, dean of the University Community and Technical College. The honorary doctor of laws degree will be conferred on Howard L. Collier, director of finance for the State of Ohio, by Dr. William S. Carlson, president of The University of Toledo. Dr. Carlson also will introduce Governor Rhodes. Preston Levis, chairman of the UT Board of Trustees, will dedicate the Scott Park campus and lay the cornerstone.

The invocation will be offered by Monsignor Wenceslaus A. Czajkowski, pastor of St. Hyacinth parish, and the benediction by Reverend Robert A. Culp, pastor of the First Church of God.

An open house in the facilities will be held after the dedication ceremonies until 4 p.m. Special groups, clubs, and business and technical groups will tour the campus on Saturday, April 25. On Sunday, April 26, the campus will be open for public tours from noon until 5 p.m.

Scott Park, which is about two miles from the main campus, was the initial endowment of the University. This campus was the site of The University of Toledo from 1920 until 1931, when the Bancroft Street campus was opened.

Early in 1967, the University asked the Lucas County Common Pleas Court to rule that development of Scott Park as a campus for the University Community and Technical College would conform to the trust established by Jesup Scott and his wife. The court so ruled and ground was broken on June 9, 1967, for the first phase of the college's new Scott Park facilities. In 1969 classes resumed at Scott Park.

A 510-foot concourse of 15,711 square feet links four of the six buildings at Scott Park. The four-story Learning Resources Center (81,000 square feet) houses the library, faculty offices and the Technological Media Center. The two-story Academic Services Center (28,000 square feet) contains administrative offices, computer facilities, business machine areas and the bookstore. The two-story Classroom Center (38,000 square feet) has 31 classrooms, including two seating 138 students each, and a mechanical equipment room. The two-story Basic Science Laboratory Center (30,000 square feet) contains drafting, electronics, measurements, biology, physics and chemistry laboratories.

The one-floor Engineering Technology Laboratory Center (22,228 square feet) houses strength of material, civil, machine tool, industrial chemistry, automotive and mechanical technology laboratories. The one-story Non-Academic Services Center (15,000 square feet) contains storage, maintenance and dining facilities.

The Community and Technical College currently has an enrollment of 3,000 day students and 2,000 evening students. Over 75 per cent of its students are enrolled in para-professional programs, preparing for careers as technicians.

As one of the seven colleges within The University of Toledo, the Community and Technical College is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is the only college with associate degree programs all of which have been approved by the Ohio Board of Regents.

Architects for the Scott Park complex were Samborn, Steketee, Otis and Evans, Toledo. Landscape architects were Johnson, Johnson and Roy, Inc., Ann Arbor, Michigan.

An environmental teach-in sponsored by FATE (For Action and Teaching on Environment) will be held at The University of Toledo on April 21, 22 and 23. Scheduled activities include speakers, panel discussions, workshop and a concert by folk singer Tom Paxton.

FATE is a recently formed student organization which hopes to inform members of the University community and residents of the Toledo area of the hazards of environmental deterioration and of specific environment-related problems affecting the Toledo area. The group's chairman, Ivar Szper, a graduate assistant in biology at UT, sees the April teach-in as one step toward realizing these goals.

Based on the theme, "From Apathy to Extinction," the three-day teach-in is aimed not only at calling attention to the pollution problem, but at seeking workable solutions, Mr. Szper said.

The program will open on April 21 at 7:45 p.m. in the UT Field House. Scheduled are remarks by Mr. Szper, Dr. William S. Carlson, UT president; William Ensign, mayor of the city of Toledo; and Dr. Moshe Shapiro, dean of the Graduate School of Public Health at the University of Pittsburgh; and a speech by John Glenn, former astronaut and candidate for the Democratic Party nomination for one of Ohio's two U.S. Senate seats. Mr. Glenn will discuss "Environment in the 70's."

Concluding the April 21 program will be a concert by Tom Paxton, folk-singer and song writer.

A panel discussion on "The Population Crisis" at 9 a.m. in the Student Union Ingman Room will open the April 22 segment of the teach-in. Moderating the discussion will be Dr. Leonard Nelson, professor and chairman of the physiology

department at the Medical College of Ohio at Toledo. Participants include Rev. Waldemar Argow, minister of the First Unitarian Church of Toledo, who will discuss "A New Look at Abortion"; John Galbraith, representative to the Ohio House of Representatives, who will speak on "Laws to Legalize Abortion"; and William Hancock, executive director of Toledo's Planned Parenthood League, who will discuss "Planned Parenthood."

At 11 a.m., also in the Student Union, Dr. Jeffrey Burnham, microbiologist at the Medical College, will lecture and show slides on "Research in Microbiological Techniques in Controlling Pollutants." Speaking at 1 p.m. will be David Coulter, Lucas County Soil Conservation Service, who will discuss "Soil Erosion Problems in Lucas County."

A 2 p.m. panel discussion on "Lake Erie" will include presentations by Dr. George Kunkle, associate professor of geology at UT, on "Geology of Lake Erie"; Lou Campbell, naturalist, author and writer for The Toledo Times, on "Natural History of Lake Erie"; and Daryl Allison, district supervisor, Ohio Fish and Wildlife Division, on "Problems of Lake Erie." At 4 p.m., Mrs. Carter Henderson, New York City Citizens for Clean Air, will speak on "Citizen-Action for Clean Air."

The April 22 evening program, scheduled for 7:45 in the Field House, will include speeches by Dr. James Zumberge, director of the School of Earth Sciences at the University of Arizona, who will discuss "Natural Hazards of Man's Physical Environment"; Harold A. Kelly, sanitary engineering consultant with Jones and Henry Ltd.; and Dr. Myron E. Wegman, director, Graduate School of Public Health at the University of Michigan, who will speak on "Risks and Benefits."

Also scheduled are speeches by Thomas L. Ashley, representative from Ohio's ninth district to the U.S. House of Representatives, on "Current Legislation" and by Ned Skeldon, head of Clearwater, Inc. in Toledo, on "The Pollution Problem of the Maumee River and Lake Erie."

Speakers at a 9:15 a.m. session on April 23 will be Carol Pietrykowski, member of Toledo's City Council, who will discuss the "Mayor's Commission on Pollution"; Wilbur J. Pierce, purchasing manager of Detroit Edison, on "Urban Growth Patterns-Past and Future"; and Paul Goff, head naturalist, Toledo Metropolitan Parks, on the "Value of Parks in Modern Society."

Teach-in participants will be encouraged to attend a speech by Dr. Paul Ehrlich, professor of biology and director of graduate study for the department of biological sciences at Stanford University (California) and author of "The Population Bomb." Dr. Ehrlich will address a University Convocation scheduled for noon on April 23 in Doermann Theater.

Various campus organizations, including the Newman Club, Young Democrats, FATE and the Students for a Democratic Society, will sponsor workshops on Thursday afternoon, as will the Le Leche League, a Toledo organization. The workshops will be held in the Student Union Ingman Room.

The teach-in's final session, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Field House, will include remarks by Charles Sweeney, Ohio Tuberculosis Society, on the "Citizens' Role in Air Conservation"; Dr. Gary F. Bennett, associate professor of biochemical engineering at UT, on "A Sane Approach to Pollution Control"; Dr. Lawrence B. Slobodkin, professor and director of ecology at Stoney Brook (Long Island, New York), on "The Ecological Crisis and Social Justice"; and Dr. Elliot Tramer, assistant professor of biology at UT.

Films on pollution will be shown from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. on April 22 and 23 in room 216 of the Student Union.

All programs scheduled during the teach-in are free and open to the public.

Dr. Richard E. Peterson, research psychologist with the Berkeley, California office of the Educational Testing Service and former staff director of the Washington-based Committee On Campus Tensions of the American Council On Education, will address the fifth in a special series of seminars on the organization and administration of a university being sponsored by The University of Toledo's president, Dr. William S. Carlson.

Dr. Peterson will discuss "Regional Universities and Comprehensive Colleges: Some Ideas" at 3 p.m. on Thursday, April 30, in the Dana Auditorium of the University's Engineering-Science Building.

The seminar is expected to last for about two hours. It will be free and open to the public.

Purpose of the series is to provide a forum at The University of Toledo for distinguished scholars who have relevant suggestions on effecting developments needed to meet the new and changing objectives in higher education in the future, Dr. Carlson said.

Dr. Peterson earned bachelor's degrees in political science and in psychology at the University of California at Berkeley, and master's and doctoral degrees in education and counseling psychology also at the University of California at Berkeley.

He has held faculty posts as a research assistant, counselor or instructor in psychology at UC-Berkeley's School of Education, at Contra Costa College (San Pablo, California) and at Trenton State College (Trenton, New Jersey).

Dr. Peterson joined the Educational Testing Service in 1962 as research psychologist with its developmental research division and as chairman of its higher education research group. Since January, 1968, he has served as research psychologist with ETS's western office at Berkeley.

He directed staff work of the Special Committee On Campus Tensions for the American Council On Education in Washington, D.C., from August through November, 1969.

He is the author of "The Scope of Organized Student Protest in 1964-65," published by the Educational Testing Service in 1966; of "The Student Left in American Higher Education," published in the winter issue of "Daedalus" in 1968; of "The Scope of Organized Student Protest and Institutional Functioning," published by ETS in 1969; and of "The Student Protest Movement: Facts, Interpretations and a Plea," published by the American Psychological Association this year.

He also has co-authored or edited a number of studies dealing with student psychology and school administration at the secondary school or college level.

The sixth and final seminar of the 1969-70 series will be addressed by Dr. W. Max Wise, professor of higher education at Columbia University's Teachers College, on Thursday, May 14.
