3 Port Clinton Tank Co. War Fatalities Reported

Capt. Harold Collins, Former Toledo U. Athlete, Included in Casualty Report 7/35/46

PORT CLINTON, O., July 25—Relatives here have been notified of the deaths of three more members of the Port Clinton Tank Company which was overwhelmed on Bataan in 1942.

The three, Capt. Arthur Burholt, Capt. Harold Collins, formerly of Toledo, and Sergt. Elmer N. Smith, were reported by the War Department to have been killed last Dec. 5 while being transported aboard a Japanese vessel in the Pacific area. They had been prisoners of war since the fall of Bataan. Captain Burholt, 36, former ath-lete of Port Clinton High School,

was the son of Mrs. Fred Gott-schalk, Port Clin-ton, and a nephew of Charles Burholt, Toledo. His wife, Capt. Vir-His wife, Capt. Virginia Van Renselear Burholt, joined the WACs after her husband was taken prison-er and is sta-tioned at Thayer General Hospital,

Nashville, Tenn. A former officer of the Port Clinton unit, Captain Burholt was serving as plans train-ing officer of the 192nd Tank Bat-Nashville, Tenn. talion when the fighting began on

Captain Collins, 30, a former student at the University of Toledo,

where he played football, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Collins of Carroll Township and a brother of Clyde S. Collins, Toledo. Two uncles, David Collins and Ellsworth Heistand, also live in Toledo. Captain Collins' wife, Ger-
