FOR COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

University Board Has Chosen
the Faculty

WITHOUT COMPENSATION

Physicians and Others Will Serve
This Department—Plans to
Get Money.

Members of the faculties of the college of medicine and college of pharmacy, which it is proposed to conduct in connection with the Toledo university, were selected last night at a meeting of the trustees.

Dr. Pyle, chairman of the committee appointed to name the faculties submitted the report, which was adopted unanimously. There are still a few vacancies to fill.

In view of the ruling of the city solicitor that the city auditor and treasurer have no legal right to cash orders drawn by the university trustees, no attempt was made to approve a schedule of claims against the board amounting to about \$200. During the meeting the solicitor's ruling was not discussed and the board is proceeding to perfect its plans for an institution of higher education in Toledo.

After the meeting, however, the financial situation was informally talked over among the board members. Mr. Northup said that proceedings in mandamus against the city auditor and treasurer to compel them to cash university warrants could not be had until the courts reconvene in the fall. Therefore, in order that the legal status of the board may be determined it is probable that some taxpayer will begin an injunction suit to restrain the board from entering into contracts with professors and teachers or incurring other liabilities. A petition for an injunction can be presented to a common pleas judge sitting in chambers during court vacation, and a temporary restraining order issued or refused, according to the showing made by the petitioner.

The members of the faculties of the colleges of medicine and pharmacy appointed last night have been serving in the Toledo Medical college, which the university board has leased. They are volunteers in the work, serving without cash compensation, and have agreed to continue to do so for the university.
