

# Youths Look At Careers In Health Work

## 50 Area Students Visit Departments Of Medical College

About 50 high school students toured the Medical College of Ohio Wednesday, a first in a program to interest area youths in health careers.

Sponsored by the women's auxiliary of the Toledo Academy of Medicine, the program formerly focused attention on high school girls interested in becoming nurses. Dr. Howard Madigan, the college's associate dean for continuing education, said.

This was broadened in recent years to include other health careers, such as physical therapists, research chemists, and doctors.

### Cites Influence

Dr. Madigan said that the opening of the medical school offers young people an even better chance to see what type jobs are available.

"This is just a small example of the influence the medical school can have on the community," Dr. Madigan said.

The students, many of whom are members of health careers clubs, heard Dr. Robert Page, dean, tell about the history of the college and its future plans.

### Discussions Held

They visited departments of anatomy, neurology, microbiology, and biochemistry, where discussions were held.

Mrs. Robert E. Youngen and Mrs. Thomas Mahoney are co-chairmen of the health careers committee of the academy's auxiliary.

While the high school students were visiting the college, the college students were spending the day with doctors in northwestern Ohio.
