Dr. William Max Wise, professor of higher education at Teachers College of Columbia University (New York), will address the sixth and final session of a series of seminars on the organization and administration of a university which are sponsored by Dr. William S. Carlson, president of The University of Toledo.

Dr. Wise will address a seminar session scheduled for 3 p.m. Thursday, May 14, in Dana Auditorium of the University's Engineering-Science Building.

The seminar is expected to last about two hours. It will be free and open to the public.

Purpose of the series, Dr. Carlson said, is to provide a forum at The University of Toledo for distinguished scholars who have relevant suggestions on developments needed to meet the new and changing objectives of higher education in the future.

Dr. Wise has held his current faculty post at Columbia University since 1967. Prior to his appointment at Columbia, he was vice president of the Danforth Foundation with specific responsibility for the foundation's activity aimed at helping graduate schools improve their programs for the preparation of college teachers.

He earned his bachelor's degree from the State University of Iowa (Ames), his master's degree from Columbia and a doctor of education degree in higher education, also from Columbia.

During World War II, Dr. Wise was an instructor and psychologist with the U.S. Air Force. From 1948 to 1956, he served as dean of student personnel at the University of Florida (Gainesville). During the next seven years he held the rank of professor at Teachers College, Columbia University, before becoming associate director and finally vice president of the Danforth Foundation.

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His principal interests have been the demography of American college students, the administration of student affairs in higher education, graduate education, especially in the doctoral-level preparation of college teachers, and the processes of collegiate government.

He is the author of "They Came for the Best of Reasons: College Students Today," published by the American Council on Education in 1958, and of "The Politics of the Private College: An Inquiry into the Processes of Collegiate Government," published by the Hazen Foundation in 1968.

He and his wife, Marion McDowell Wise, are residents of Stonington, Connecticut, and of New York City.

The University of Toledo Library is being made available for use by students of universities which have suspended operations in the wake of last week's campus unrest, according to a joint announcement today (May 11) by UT President William S. Carlson and by Patrick Barkey, director of University libraries at The University of Toledo.

Mr. Barkey said that students from other universities wishing to use the library should stop at the University's traffic control booth on Towerview Boulevard to obtain a temporary parking permit, and should carry a student identification card from their home college or university.

The University Library is open from 7:30 a.m. until midnight, Monday through Friday; from 9 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Saturday; and from 1 p.m. until midnight on Sunday.

A report of some findings of U.S. Coast Guard surveys of the iceberg-producing Greenland ice sheet, written by Dr. William S. Carlson, professor of geology and glaciology and president of The University of Toledo, has been published in the April, 1970, issue of "Science Magazine."

Dr. Carlson, who wrote his doctoral dissertation on the movements of the Upernivik Glacier -- a principal iceberg producer and one of those dealt with in the report -- was a member of the U.S. Coast Guard expedition which surveyed the advance and retreat of glaciers terminating on the west coast of Greenland during the summer of 1968.

The Coast Guard continued the survey of glacial movement last summer (1969).

In his summary of information gained by the recent studies, Dr. Carlson reports newly developed information on the thickness of the ice, configuration of the subglacial floor and the relationship of these elements to the surface forms of Greenland glaciers.

"Preliminary data (from survey and aerial photographs) indicate that there has been dramatic retirement of some of the glaciers and particularly of Upernivik," Dr. Carlson writes.

Dr. Carlson reports that 1969 survey results indicate a substantial retirement of Upernivik since 1947. His own studies of 1931 and 1947 indicated earlier retreats of the glacier from its reported position in 1886-1887.

"The Coast Guard," Dr. Carlson proposes, "should give serious consideration to comparing its aerial photographs with the large scale and fairly detailed aeronautical charts published by the Army Map Service, and the charts and maps available through the Danish Geodetic Institute."

The honorary doctor of laws degree will be awarded to three persons at The University of Toledo's spring quarter commencement ceremonies on June 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the UT Field House.

They are Dr. Ray A. Billington, senior research associate at the Huntington Library, San Marino, California; Edwin D. Dodd, president and chief operating officer of Owens-Illinois, Inc.; and Willard I. Webb, Jr., chairman of the board of The Ohio Citizens Trust Company.

The degrees will be conferred by Dr. William S. Carlson, UT president.

Dr. Billington, a native of Bay City, Michigan, received the bachelor of philosophy degree from the University of Wisconsin, the master of arts degree from the University of Michigan and the doctor of philosophy degree from Harvard University.

He has held his post with the Huntington Library since 1963 and had served from 1944 to 1963 as professor of history at Northwestern University. Dr. Billington has been a visiting professor at Case-Western Reserve University, The Ohio State University and Harvard University. He was a director of the Massachusetts Federal Writers' Project (1936-37), a Guggenheim Memorial Fellow (1943-44), a member of the board of trustees for The Newberry Library (1952-63) and a director of the Social Science Research Council (1952). Between 1953 and 1954, he was Harmsworth professor of American history at Oxford University (England).

Dr. Billington is the author of some 14 books, including the text "Westward Expansion," which first was published in 1949 and currently is in

its third edition. In addition, he has written numerous articles and book reviews.

Dr. Billington has served as an unofficial adviser to The University of Toledo's doctoral program in American or urban history.

As president of Owens-Illinois, Inc., Mr. Dodd heads the 85th largest industrial company in the United States. He had been general manager of the Forest Products Division, the company's second largest operating division, for seven years when elected president in 1968. Mr. Dodd became a vice president of O-I in 1959, an executive vice president in 1964 and a director in 1966.

Mr. Dodd joined Owens-Illinois in 1946. He became director of public relations for O-I in 1949, production manager for its Libbey Glass Division in 1954 and Libbey factories manager two years later. He served in the latter post until he joined the forest products group in 1958.

A graduate of The Ohio State University and of the Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration, Mr. Dodd entered the U.S. Army as a private in 1943 and rose to major while serving in the Pacific. He was awarded the Legion of Merit for outstanding service in the Pacific and Japan and the Military Merit Medal by the Philippine government.

Mr. Dodd is a member of the Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority, past president of both the Toledo Board of Education and the board of trustees of Maumee Valley Country Day School, a trustee of Toledo Hospital, member of the executive council of the Harvard Business School Association and alumni representative to the board of The Ohio State University Development Fund.

In 1970, he was elected to the board of visitors of Berry College (Mount Berry, Ga.) and to the board of directors of the Toledo Trust Co. He also was named to President Nixon's National Industrial Pollution Control Council. Mr. Dodd is a director of the Ohio Bell Telephone Company and the National Petro

Chemicals Corporation.

In 1950, he chaired Toledo's first Business-Industry-Education Day, now an annual event and was named Toledo's Outstanding Young Man in 1954 and one of Ohio's five outstanding young men in 1955. He has been active in a variety of civic affairs including United Appeal, American Red Cross, Junior Achievement and the Toledo Council of Social Agencies.

Mr. Dodd is married to the former Marie Marshall of Coshocton, Ohio. They have one daughter, Mrs. Jay (Marjorie Lee) Wannamaker.

Mr. Webb served as president of the Ohio Citizens Trust Co. from 1940 until his election in 1964 as chairman of the board. He joined the bank as a vice president and director in 1933, a year after its founding, and was assigned additional duties as secretary the following year.

Mr. Webb also currently serves as vice president, secretary and director of the Commodore Perry Company and as a director of the Sheller-Globe Corp., Ohio Plate Glass Co., Monroe Auto Equipment Co., and the Standard of American Life Insurance Company (Park Ridge, Ill.).

A recipient of the bachelor of arts degree from Williams College (Williamstown, Mass.), he studied law at the University of Michigan.

He is the Ohio chairman for the Foundation of Commercial Banks, past treasurer of the Ohio Bankers Association and a former member of the retirement committee of the American Bankers Association.

Currently, Mr. Webb is chairman of the Flower Hospital board of trustees and a board member of the Hospital Service Association of Toledo (Blue Cross-Blue Shield), Toledo Safety Council and the Toledo Area Development Council and is the bank's representative on the board of trustees of the endowment fund at the Toledo Museum of Art, Edward Drummond Libbey estate and Scott Properties Corp. On July 1, he will conclude nine years' service as a board member of Defiance College.

He also serves on the advisory boards of St. Vincent Hospital and the Toledo Girl Scouts of America and is treasurer and director of the Cancer Cytology Research Fund of Toledo, Inc.

Mr. Webb, a native Toledoan, and his wife, Mary, have three sons -- Willard I. Webb, III., president of Ohio Citizens; Thomas I., an attorney; and John M., a realtor.

There are some 930 candidates for degrees at The University of Toledo where commencement ceremonies are held at the end of each quarter and at the end of the summer session.
