Completion Of New Buildings Near

Completion of the University's new \$300,000 classroom building project is near, according to administration reports. The buildings will house approximately 1,500 students and will combine ROTC classes with those in physics, business administration, chemistry and accounting.

The unit includes 18 classrooms and nine large laboratories. There are 10 instructors' offices. The ROTC lecture hall itself will seat 200 men as will two student halls. In addition to these classrooms there are separate work rooms, wash rooms, storerooms and men's and women's laboratories. Each of the regulation classrooms seat from 75 to 100 students.

ROTC will occupy one com-

plete floor of the east wing of the business administration hall. On this floor are stored clothing and ordinance supplies. In addition to regular ROTC classrooms is a small reading room.

According to the unit's building sources, the material has all been gone over carefully, assuring a maximum of safety for the students. The buildings are fire-proof. On the outside, canvas covered porches add to the appearance of the buildings.

Except for a few minor projects to be completed, the unit has only one major task to be finished, that being the erection of tables in the chemistry labs.

H. J. Sullivan, government engineer in charge of temporary college building facilities in the United States has called the Toledo unit one of the finest

from the structural and functional standpoints he has ever seen.

There are nine furnaces, all thermostat controlled, which will be converted to oil heat this winter. Lighting will be furnished by fluorescent tubes. In case there is an overflow of classes in the University proper, students will use the available rooms in the unit.

A flagpole will be erected in the circle between the two wings.

Present Total Includes 87 Nurses

Last year's record enrolment of 5,641 students, a mark which bid fair to stand for some time, has already been shattered by this semester's mark of 5,864, according to Hazel D. Geiner, registrar.

Miss Geiner said the total includes 4,310 daytime students compared with 4,281 in day sessions last year. The present total includes 87 registered in the nurses centralized program.

Total number of students registered for PL 16 stands at 265 while 2,652 have enrolled in PL 346. This makes a total of 2,917 students attending the University under the G. I. Bill of Rights, Miss Geiner said.

The figures released were totaled as of last Monday evening, Miss Geiner said.

1,554 Enrolled In Night Classes

Evening sessions enrolment of 1,554 students tabulated by the registrar's office last Monday shows a slight increase over the approximate 1,300 enrolment in the evening sessions last spring.

Due to the increased number of sections opened in many courses, most students were able to enrol in their desired course, Brenton W. Stevenson, director of evening sessions, explained. Six sections, the greatest number ever to be opened in any one course was started this fall in beginning accounting, he revealed.

Seven new courses were added to the schedule this fall. They include radio broadcasting, radio program planning and building, problems of current international relations, principle of real estate, motor traffic management, and a course in foundry, forging and welding.
