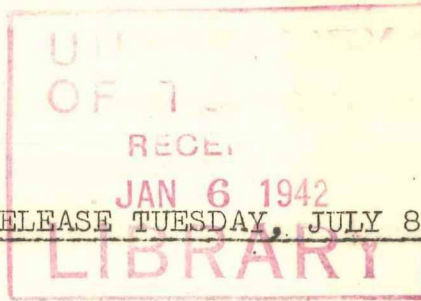

Thirty prominent Britons have just asked that there be consultation between the American and British peoples "for consideration and proclamation of our post-war purposes."

"We must be equally anxious to ensure that we win the peace as well as the war," declares the call for consultation, which was cabled from London to Evarts Seelye Scudder as liaison officer between the London Outpost and National Headquarters of the Committee to Defend America by Aiding the Allies, and released by the Committee here last night (Monday).
