Tuition To Be Paid For Children Of War Dead; Goal Set At \$6000

To establish a \$6000 scholarship fund for the children of University servicemen killed in World War II will be the aim of the Veteran's Club during their war memorial from Nov. 12 to Dec. 8.

Money obtained will be placed in a general fund or in war bonds with accumulating interest until it is needed. Captain Frank R. Hickerson and Dr. O. Garfield Jones, advisers to the group, are co-chairmen of the board of trustees. Other members are Donald S. Parks, Sarah S. Bissell and Dr. George A. Gullette.

Auction To Be Held

Treasurer Woodward Resigns

Announcement of the resignation of Miss Emma L. Woodward, as treasurer of the University, was made Monday by President Philip C. Nash.

Coming to the University in September, 1918, for the purpose of raising the standards of the University's accounting system, Miss Woodward served during many of this institution's most important years. During the years of building and the Army program, the expenditures totaled \$1,000,000 a year.

Miss Woodward was born near Georgetown, Ky., and attended Georgetown College. She is a member of the University Faculty Dames, The Friends of the University Library, The Quota Club, the P. E. O., and attends Ashland Avenue Baptist Church.

Succeeding Miss Woodward is Carl R. Brand, who has been in charge of the ESMWT accounts at the University for two years. He is a graduate of the University where he specialized in accounting. He will inaugurate a new system of accounting, under the supervision of Konopak and Dalton, accountants.
