

TU Directors ^{APR 14 1961} Approve Record \$4.3 Million Budget For University

1961-62 Figures Up \$170,577 Over Current Year; Pay Increase Provided For Members Of Faculty

A record-high budget of \$4,372,070 was approved last night by the University of Toledo board of directors for the 1961-62 school year.

The new budget represents an increase of \$170,577 over the current one. A total of \$3,282,723 is provided for salaries and wages, an increase of \$270,599 over the previous year.

The university anticipates income of \$4,385,070, with \$2,328,000 coming from students and \$1,745,000 from the two-mill TU levy. Other sources of income are athletics, student activities, state board of education and community service programs.

Some \$123,000 of the salary adjustments will go for 3 per cent increases for faculty members and the addition of 10 faculty members, Dr. William S. Carlson, TU president, told the board.

4 Pct. Increase

Another \$80,000, representing a 4 per cent increase, will go to secretarial, clerical and maintenance personnel, with \$49,121 added to meet increases for summer session personnel.

Eight of the 10 new faculty members will be in the college of arts and sciences where a strengthening program is under way, Dr. Carlson said.

Scholarships and grants-in-aid were increased by \$35,000 to \$160,000. Dr. Carlson said this is being done to give deserving students an opportunity to go to college in the face of hardships brought by present economic conditions.

The budget showed that non-resident students, paying \$20 a semester hour, will be contributing \$936,000, an increase of \$134,000, this year. This compares with \$1,110,000, a \$40,000 increase, expected from students who live in Toledo and pay \$14 a semester hour.

Dr. Carlson said this reflects

rising enrollment, especially by nonresidents from a broad area. Applications for admission from nonresidents are running about 25 per cent ahead of this time last year, he said.

While the increase is encouraging, Dr. Carlson said, it also presents problems of housing nonresidents who do not commute. With all dormitory rooms taken for the next school year, he said, it is not too early to consider building additional housing facilities.

Doan Agrees To Serve On Medical School Unit

Dr. Charles Doan, retired dean of the Ohio State University college of medicine, has agreed to serve as consultant to Toledo's medical school committee, Dr. Maurice Schnitker, board and committee member, said. City Council has approved \$6,500 for a consultant.

Dr. Schnitker told the board that Dr. Doan believes Toledo is in a favorable position for location of the state's fourth medical school.

He also said the consultant feels that such a school should be located on the TU campus and the TU board should be 100 per cent behind the project. The committee is studying the feasibility of establishing a medical school here.
