The annual Hole-In-One Golf Tournament sponsored by The University of Toledo Alumni Association will celebrate its 30th anniversary from Friday, Aug. 12, through Sunday, Aug. 21, at a new location, Heather Downs Country Club's north course.

The public is invited to attend the opening tee-off at 11 a.m. Aug. 12 as UT President Glen R. Driscoll, Toledo Mayor Doug DeGood, Toledo City Council members Donna Owens and Peter Ujvagi, and Chamber of Commerce President J. Michael Porter try their luck. Also shooting will be Stan Goldman, general chairman of the 1953 tournament; Tom Karpinski, UT Alumni Association president, and Charles Bracken, president of the UT Alumni Foundation.

Daily hours of the annual event to raise funds for student loans will be 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Each ticket buys three shots off the tee as golfers and duffers alike vie for the \$1,000 grand prize awarded for each hole-in-one and daily merchandise prizes given those shooting closest to the pin.

Last year 5 of the estimated 4,000 participants scored holes-in-one.

Over the years, the tournament has generated more than \$7.5 million in student loan money and benefited more than 7,500 students under a matching federal program. Each dollar generated by the tourney is matched by \$9 under the National Direct Student Loan program.

UT alumni in charge of the 1983 event are association vice presidents David G. Huey and Jacqueline Knowlton Knepper assisted by general tournament chairwoman Dee Heywood Talmage; Michael G. Monaghan, assistant chairman; Elliott Miller, finance; Jeffrey M. Scott, prizes; Judith Denman Kasper and Daniel Kasper, volunteers; Roy Hummel, properties; Greg Fish, rules; Susan M. Falzone, publicity; Don Baker, business and industry; and Edward C. Schmakel, UT director emeritus of alumni relations, operations.

The move to Heather Downs was prompted by the recent sale of the Par 3 golf course, site of the tourney for 29 years, to The Andersons.

The University of Toledo's Board of Trustees today (Aug. 4) approved salary increases for administrative personnel, including University President Glen R. Driscoll, which average somewhat less than 7 per cent.

Salary increases for UT faculty were approved at last month's Board meeting. Those increases included 3 per cent for all faculty and an average of 4 per cent based on merit.

The Board also approved the lease-purchase of a NAS 6650 computer to expand the data processing capabilities of the University's Computer Services office to meet rapidly growing campus demands. It is expected to be in operation by the start of the fall quarter and will be used for both administrative and academic data processing tasks.

Included in a list of new faculty appointments were Sixth District Court of Appeals Judges Peter M. Handwork and Andy Douglas, both of whom were named adjunct assistant professors of business technologies in the University Community and Technical College.

And President Driscoll reported a total of \$253,258 in various gifts, grants, and scholarships, including \$81,717 from the University of Toledo Alumni Foundation and \$1,955 in individual gifts to the University's anthropology/archaeology program.

University of Toledo President Glen R. Driscoll received an honorary doctor of laws degree from Hanyang University in Seoul, Korea, today (Aug. 31) and expressed hope that it would be the final step in cementing a sister university relationship between Hanyang and UT.

Dr. Driscoll received the degree at a commencement ceremony from Lyun Joon Kim, founder and chairman of the board of trustees of the Seoul institution. Dr. Kim received an honorary doctor of humanities degree at UT's June commencement.

"The degree I have received, together with the degree bestowed by The University of Toledo on President Kim, is symbolic of the meaningful relationship being established between our universities," Dr. Driscoll said in his response to the honor.

He pointed out that UT had 22 Korean students for the 1982-83 academic year, but that as many as 75 may enroll for this fall quarter.

"It is my belief that education remains the best hope for healing any breach and bridging any gap between different cultures and ideologies," he told the Hanyang graduates.

Dr. Driscoll said he hopes one or two UT faculty members will be teaching at Hanyang in the spring quarter or in a quarter next year and that Hanyang faculty or advanced students will be on this campus in 1984-85.
