remark that a talk on parachute ~~operations~~ or other military operation
might be more useful at this time, Philip C. Nash, president of the
University of Toledo, ^{lectured} ~~spoke~~ to history students ^{yesterday (May 15)} on international
happenings since 1918.

Nations must agree to
cut off trade relations with countries that break treaties, he said,
ⁱⁿ illustrating the idea ~~with~~ a discussion of the League of Nations.
The covenant of the League is one of the greatest documents in history,
along with the Magna Charta and the Declaration of Independence, he ~~said~~,
because it is the first great attempt toward the formation of a world
organization necessary for peace.

The failure of the League was not
so much the fault of England or any other one nation, but rather
due to the difficulty of operating new machinery, Mr. Nash stated. It
was comparatively easy for the League to settle the dispute between Greece
and Bulgaria in 1926, he explained, because neither of the two countries
was very powerful. But when the crisis came in 1930 with Japan's
invasion of China, the League was unable to control the situation because
of its own inexperience ~~in~~ in handling nations which fail to keep
~~the~~ agreements.
